## Blessings from Pastor Tino | "Focused on the Future"

What a 2019 journey it has been beloved family. November has quickly come and gone and as I return from my vacation time at the end of November, it will be Advent! November was a time of reflection of our Veterans who have served our Nation. As a Veteran myself, I am remembering those who have accompanied me in foxholes, trainings, and can't forget those 25-mile quarterly road marches. As a Gold Star Brother, I am also remembering our families who have lost loved ones in times of war and peace and the hardship that it creates for them who are left behind.

As a kid in Kindergarten, wondering why we were going home so early from school one morning, only to see my parents, older siblings, relatives and friends – crying from the news that my brother Chris was killed in action (KIA) in Vietnam from friendly fire. I only have some mental images of my older brother, but I remember the explicit images of the sorrow my family experienced from the loss – from the ultimate sacrifice to this Nation. Let us remember all who have served, and those who did not return to their families, those who are still missing in action (MIA). Let us keep in our prayers those who are currently wearing the uniform to protect and defend this Nation and let us also pray for their families who also serve this Nation from a different standpoint. Sweet Land of Liberty – comes at a great cost.



I had the privilege of helping with our Eco-Justice for Youth Camp in October. The enormity of the plastic that is found in our oceans and on mother earth—what have we've done and what are we doing to ourselves and our earth mother? The youth learned the impact of plastics to the ocean creatures and the effects of climate change. As a church, for example, we changed our cups, lids and straws at our Frosty POG booth at last October's Maui Fair, that decompose quickly and are eco-friendlier. We are hoping to change our lighting to LED. Every Youth that attended the camp received a "spork" which is a wooden utensil that has a fork on one side and a spoon on the other and is washable. The Youth also participated in beach cleanup and worked at the watershed in Lahaina. As churches, we use so many plates, spoons, forks, napkins, etc. Iao UCC hopes to transition to become eco-friendly and lead by example along with our youth.

As we move toward another Advent Season together, let us reflect on a rebirth of our spirit and our beloved church we call Iao UCC. Let this be a season of quietness, anticipation, reflection and prayer. I am thinking of my words from a few Sundays ago on who Iao UCC has become and is becoming:

"Then Jesus came to town. A demonstration on how Christ calls his Church to not only reach out to the rejected, but more important is what happens to the rejected, the othered when they experience Christ by our <u>words</u> and our <u>actions</u> when they feel the love of God surround them, when they feel as beloved children. God receives the rejected, the othered, and rejoices over the church that embraces them as beloved."

Let us also be thankful for the hard work that continues to reflect the dedication of so many of our Communities, partners, members, non-members, and thankfulness of those who continue to support this church from afar.

#### **Historical Document:**

"Having undertaken for the Glory of God and advancement of the Christian Faith and Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the First Colony in the Northern Parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one of another, Covenant and Combine ourselves together in a Civil Body Politic, for our better ordering and preservation and furtherance of the ends aforesaid; and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute and frame such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitutions and Offices from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the Colony, unto which we promise all due submission and obedience."

— Mayflower Compact (November 11, 1620)

#### **Historical Connections:**

The majority of members of the <u>immigrant</u> Pilgrims' group were Separatists. Separatists were essentially Puritans that had split from the Church of England (which was technically the only legal church in England at that time). However, not all Pilgrims shared this religion (as some had remained part of the Church of England). The United Church of Christ is a historical continuation of the General Council of Congregational Christian churches founded under the influence of New England Pilgrims and Puritans.


The oldest living lao UCC vet now is Mike Takamatsu, who was in the Army during the Korean War. (See below)



## Katsumi Tadakuma

Katsumi Tadakuma, 98 of Waipahu, passed away on March 9, 2019 at his residence. He was born on July 15, 1920 in Haiku, Maui. Katsumi was a mill supervisor for Wailuku Sugar Company. (Fr. the Maui News obituary).

Jane Tesoro said, of Uncle Katsumi: "He loved music, and played the harmonica (like a lot of men in his generation). He served as Stanta Claus for our church Christmas parties — and even bought special black boots for the pageants! He was a dedicated Boy Scouts leader. Was a tall man (for Japanese), and his wife Kimiko loved to dance hula. He sharpened lawn mowers, as a side business. Their family house was adjacent to the old sugar mill, across from St. Anthony's, in plantation housing. Katsumi was a baritone, in the men's choir. I remember he had a hearty laugh, and was good-natured."

## Kats Matsuo

Katsuko "Kats" Matsuo, 89, of Wailuku passed away peacefully on March 11,2019 at Hale Makua Wailuku. Kats was born in Olaa, Hawaii on September 20,1929 to Ushi and Kame Arakaki. She was the 3rd youngest of 11 children. In 1995, Kats retired from Maui Electric Co. where she was an executive secretary. In May of 1982, she won the honor of Secretary of the Year for Hawaii. She was flown to our capitol in Honolulu and was recognized by then Governor George Ariyoshi. In her free time, Kats enjoyed knitting and crocheting, gardening, cooking and baking. Her homemade Lemon Meringue Pie was so ono. But her real specialty was her New Year's Day Ozoni soup. The mizuna was grown in her garden. It brought our family and friends together every year to celebrate. Kats loved to sing in her choir at Iao UCC and always volunteered her time assisting members of her congregation. Kats was known to always be kind, caring and thoughtful and would put the needs of others before her own. She spoiled her 3 grand-daughters when they were young. She would babysit them after school and take then to get treats, sometimes shave ice or hotdogs. (Fr. the Maui News obituary.)

Jane T., on Kats: "She had a beautiful voice, and beautiful jewelry! Kats had polio as a child; She sang in the church choir (she was a soprano), like her contemporaries Hisako and Ike, and was good friends with Sue Gushiken. She was a very sweet lady, who loved her dogs. Kats used to love singing old-time Japanese folk songs. She sang with a Japanese dance band—she was the main singer of it!" And Kat Hashiro added: "...she had a very Japanese quality to her voice. Nasally, but sounded really good."

## James "Barney" Itamura

James "Barney" Mamoru Itamura, 91, passed away peacefully on June 11, 2019 at Roselani Place. He was born on November 6, 1927 in Hamakuapoko to Seiichi and Kazue Itamura. Barney is survived by his wife, Gladys; son, Dickie; grandchildren, Kelsi, Kristi, Kari and Ryne; 3 greatgrandchildren; brother David Itamura; and sister Mae Hirata. (Fr. The Maui News obituary)

Jane T. reminiscences: "James was a Pilgrim Fellowship adviser; he and the Kawasakis founded Maui Chemical (now TJs). His wife

Gladys is now in Roselani Place. They used to live in Harbor View Homes; after they retired, they bought a home in Kula and Gladys loved growing their plants up there, but when they got older they sold the house. James had beautiful skin and didn't have any wrinkles!"

## **Bill Wimberley**

William Porter Wimberley died peacefully in his sleep on Maui, June 30, 2019, having lived an enriched life of 96 years. Born on January 10, 1923, in Aberdeen, North Carolina, Bill graduated from Aberdeen High School, attended North Carolina State College, and then honorably served his country in World War II as an Army Sergeant Major, seeing active combat in Burma. Returning to civilian life, he married Connie Carroll, attended Gonzaga School of Law, then remained in Spokane, Washington where he became a renowned civil trial lawyer. Bill and others founded and helped fund the Martin Luther King Jr. Center in Spokane, an institution that, to this day, makes great strides to improve the lives of children, youth, and families through culturally responsive programs. Upon retirement, Bill and Connie moved to Maui, where they continued practicing civil responsibility and social charity as an expression of their religious faith. In the early 1990s, Bill and Connie attended lao Congregational Church, where they were welcomed into its loving community. They continued their social justice service through lao Congregational's many different missions, serving all people regardless of race, color, nationality, age, political alliance, different abilities and sexual orientation. Bill's legacy is his dedication to serving others with love, respect, and dignity. (From the Spokane Spokesman -Review obituary)



## Mabel Kobayashi

Mabel Tokunaga Kobayashi 92, of Wailuku, Maui passed away peacefully September 17, 2019 at home under Islands Hospice Services. McKinley High School Class of 1945. Graduate of University of Hawaii School of Medical Technology. Retired as Chief Medical Technologist at Maui Memorial Hospital State of Hawaii. Survived by brother, John of Aiea; sons, Paul of Aiea, Carl of Redondo Beach California and Kenneth of Wailuku. Simple private service held. Inurment at the National Cemetery of Pacific at Punchbowl at a later date. (Fr. The Maui News obituary)

Jane T.: "Mabel was a med tech at Maui Memorial (and became head med tech); she was the one who would give the PKU test (for mental retardation); she'd slice the infants' heels and took drops of blood from there. She and Herman were classmates at McKinley High School in Honolulu. Mabel's sister Helene married Spark Matsunaga. She was an important part of the Support Group. I remember picking her up for her 80-yr. old Keiro No Hi in 2015. Mabel's youngest son Kenny (the only son living on Maui) took care of her until she died, and she lived in their compound in the lower house."

## Remembering Takeo Ikeda



(The graphic on the left was the obituary for Ike Ikeda that was published in the Honolulu Star-Advertiser. What follows is a reminiscence by this newsletter's editor.)

By the time I got to meet him, Uncle Ike was already some years into the haze of dementia and Alzheimer's. I had asked Howard if I could

visit with uncle, who was then under 24/7 care in the home of a caregiver, Paz Spellicy, whose pleasant home was in Paukukalo. Paz and her husband took care of several elderly patients, one of whom was Uncle Ike. He did seem to know what Howard was saying, as he perked up when his son introduced me as a visitor




from his old church, and who was its current secretary.

I'll never forget something during that first visit with uncle—his singing of Filipino folk songs! Howard told me that some of uncle's best friends were first-generation Filipino immigrants, who had taught him the songs (some of which were ribald!). It amazed me to hear the familiar strains—in Tagalog!—of "Bahay Kubo" and "Leron Leron Sinta" coming from this old gentleman, who could barely remember things any longer. Music is definitely something that will accompany the mind and memory of anyone in old age, even if they are suffering from Alzheimer's. And it made sense to me when Howard said that

uncle was very musically inclined (see Uncle Ike's own note about learning the cello, next page) and was a long-time member of the lao Men's Choir, and later the church choir in general.

One of the stories uncle shared was that as a child growing up in Happy Valley, he loved to pick guava fruit from the many trees there along the banks of Wailuku River, and along lao Valley. So, another time that I visited with uncle Ike, I brought him some fruit, to jog his memory of small-kid time: starapple from the tree in the church, and a persimmon from a farm upcountry. He looked at me and smiled and said the Japanese word for persimmon, "kaki" (which for some odd reason amused me ::chuckle::). The photo on the right shows uncle enjoying the starapple fruit; I remember telling him the Tagalog name for it, "kaimito," and describing to him the tree it came from, which is right beside Fujitomo Hall, the church office building.







I was the 7th child in a family of 9 born on January 4, 1922 in Wailuku, Maui, Hawaii. Graduated from Perinne Baldwin High School in 1940 with 87 other classmates. I was very interested in farm animals so I got in the Ag class and the FFA group. I learned a lot about animals and gardening, and working and helping others with their project.

During my senior year, I joined the Baldwin string orchestra and learned to play the cello. I used to carry my cello home home on weekends and practice my music. I wish I could have played the cello for another year. There were 5 girls and 4 boys in our family. Our mother passed away when I was 5 years old. She was of small stature but worked very hard in the family garden raising vegetables for our table. The girls helped me with chores and cooking.


My father passed away when I was 12 years old so I remember him quite well. Our parents were very nice to us, but they expected us to follow the Golden Rule and I mean we had to follow it. They would always remind us not to "shame the family." Be honest and help each other.

In 1943 during World War II, a call for volunteers fr the army's 442nd Regimental Combat Team. A special outfit composed of all Japanese Americans. I was 21 years old and volunteered and was sworn in at the Army on March 24, 1943, in our Wailuku Armory and was shipped out to Schofield on Oahu. The we were shipped out from Honolulu on April 4, 1943 to Oakland, California. Then on to Camp Shelby, Mississippi, where we trained for a year.



The 442nd RCT went into battle in June of 1944, in Italy and stayed in Italy in September, 1944. Hiroichi Tomita and I bunked together in the same hutment in Camp Shelby and heas KIA (killed in action) on July 12, 1944 in Italy. My neighbor on Maui, Tetsuro Kawakami was KIA on July 14, 1944. My heart hurts when I think of them.



I think the toughest battle in France was when the 442nd RCT was ordered to rescue the 141st "Lost Battallion" from Texas. To rescue the 200 Texans trapped by Germans took the 442nd five days of tough combat. Our outfit lost about 1,000 men. Casualty was very heavy.

The photo on the right shows a number of WW2 veterans gathering for a ceremonial event at the Nisei Veterans Memorial Center in Kahului.

## Remembering Hisako Sano

(Fr. The Nakamura Mortuary obituary:) Hisako Shishido Sano was born on January 7, 1919 in Paia, Maui and passed on October 13, 2019 at Hale Makua Kahului. She was a devoted mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, and friend to all people she met. Her life was full of activities in her beloved church and community. Lloyd reminiscing about Aunty Hisako:

"Not bad for a 95-year old lady," was the first time, I think, back in 2014 when I started working at the Iao UCC office. That was what Aunty Hisako always said when I'd ask her how she was doing.

The year after that, it would be "Not bad for a 96-year old lady!" and so on and so forth. This bit of dialogue would always take place when I'd come by Aunty's plantation-style house at the end of winding Halenani Street in Sand Hills, ostensibly to deliver the latest issue of the Upper Room to her... but in fact it was because I just wanted to hang out a bit and talk story with Aunty, or better yet to beg for some of those fantastic mangoes she had in her backyard, when it was mango season. She was always happy and gracious to walk with me to her backyard and to point out the best mangoes to pick. That grove of mangoes was a phenomenal collection of different varieties, and the scent and tapestry of that shadowed grove always sent me right back to my childhood in the southern Philippines. I would sit on her front stoop and Aunty would sit on her chair on the lanai, and she'd tell me a bit about the old days when she used to work in the sugarcane plantations. I wish I'd made audio transcripts of those conversations and stories, as my memory of the details is failing me... as, eventually, Aunty's own memory eroded to the indistinct landscapes and general forgetfulness of an elderly human being in the grips of dementia or senescence... a place most of us will eventually arrive to, should we be so fortunate to live a long and eventful life, as Aunty Hisako did.

Hisako Shishido Ideue Sano lived to be exactly one century old. Plus another half of a sun's cycle around the planet. Few of us will be able to say that for ourselves. If for that reason alone, Aunty had a life fully lived. The last couple of years of her life, Aunty lived in Hale Makua, where she could be cared for 24/7. She had lived by herself, semi-independently but always under the watchful care of Gail and Winford, who lived in Wailuku Heights, not far from her, until she was about 98, but at that point had become physically infirm, uncertain of step and cognition. Once she walked down to Waiale Street and literally tried to hitchhike her way to the elderly day care center at the Nisei Vets place in Kahului! It was an act of care and compassion for her family to have Aunty live in Hale Makua instead, under the watchful care of the staff there. The last time I saw Aunty at Hale Makua, a couple months after her 100th birthday, she was mostly asleep, as I pushed her in her wheelchair up and down the hallways.

The second to last time I saw Aunty Hisako was on Christmas day last year; I'd gone to Hale Makua that morning, bringing a red Hymnal for Youth, which has all sorts of classic hymns in it, many of which I was certain she would recognize, as she had been a longtime choir member at church. By then, a few weeks before her 100th birthday, she could barely remember who I was, I think, but she smiled when she saw me anyway. But the best part was when I leafed through the hymnal and would start to sing an old familiar hymn—and Aunty would join me in singing! Some of the hymns she could sing from memory, all the verses and not just one. That day, Aunty Hisako and I gave each other the best Christmas gift we each had in us. That is how I will remember Aunty... her firm singing voice bringing the ageless words from those hymns back to life, the light of memory in her century-old eyes.

Aunty Hisako always seemed to be sitting near her dear friend Lillian Maeda, at church events at Kanda Hall, as you can see in these photos below. The middle photo was a Ladies' Lunch Bunch gathering, with the addition of Uncle Richard Inouye as the token man. ::chuckle::




