Christmas Tree Pesto Pizza

Ingredients

- 1 c. warm water
- 1 TBS sugar
- 1 TBS active dry yeast
- 1 TBS olive oil
- $2\ {}^{1\!\!/_2}$ c. all purpose flour
- 1 tsp salt

Pizza toppings:

Pesto (for sauce)

- 2 c. shredded mozzarella
- Sliced veggies (onion, bellpepper, olives, tomato, etc.)

Preparation

- 1. Put warm water in mixing bowl
- 2. Add sugar and yeast and mix
- 3. Let mixture sit for 10 min in warm place
- 4. Stir in olive oil
- 5. Add 2 cups of flour and mix to form ball, add more flour as needed (it'll be a little sticky)
- 6. Transfer to a floured surface and knead dough or use a bread mixer.
- 7. Let dough rise in a large oiled bowl covered with a tea towel (60-90 min)
- 8. Preheat oven to 450° F

9. Roll out dough into a large triangle (or tree shape) on a greased cookie sheet. You can cut a piece of dough to form a square for the tree stump too.

10. Spread pesto sauce on dough and add cheese and toppings. Arrange them to look like ornaments.

11. Bake for 15-20 min.

Fold egg yolk batter into egg whites and mix well. Pour into tube pan (DO NOT GREASE PAN) or use individual pans as pictured. Bake @ 350 degrees for 45 minuted. Cool thoroughly to remove from pan(s).

What are the 12 days of Christmas?

The twelve days over which the song takes place is a reference to Christianity. "The 12 Days of Christmas" historically does not reference the days leading up to Christmas, but rather the 12 days following it, also known as Twelvetide. The period begins with birth of Christ on **December 25th**, Christmas Day, and ends with the coming of the three wise men on **January 6th**, also known as the Epiphany or Three Kings Day. The weeks before Christmas are known as Advent, ending on December 24 — hence, advent calendars.

You may have seen this theory floating around via chain emails and message boards. In a nutshell, the theory claims that during a time when Christians were punished for worshiping openly, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" song was used to secretly pass on the ideology of Christianity. Per this theory, each gift on the list symbolizes a different aspect of the Christian faith:

- The Partridge in the Pear Tree is Jesus Christ.
- The **2 Turtle Doves** are The Old and New Testaments.
- The 3 French hens are Faith, Hope and Charity, the theological virtues.
- The **4 Calling Birds** are the four gospels and/or the four evangelists.
- The **5** Golden Rings are the first five books of the Old Testament.
- The **6** Geese A-laying are the six days of creation.
- The 7 Swans A-swimming are the gifts of the Holy Spirit, the seven sacraments.
- The **8 Maids A-milking** are the eight beatitudes.
- The 9 Ladies Dancing are the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit.
- The **10 Lords A-leaping** are the ten commandments.
- The **11 Pipers Piping** are the eleven faithful apostles.
- The **12 Drummers Drumming** are the twelve points of doctrine in the Apostle's Creed.

But while it is true that the "12 days" reference the days between the birth of Christ and the coming of the Magi, Snopes breaks down the many historical and logistical errors in the "hidden meanings" theory, including the biggest flaw in the claim: If Christians were living in fear of even mentioning the basic tenants of Christianity, how were they able to sing a song that mentions the word "Christmas" in every lyric?





O Come, O Come Emmanuel

"O Come, O Come Emmanuel" sounds like Gregorian chant, and essentially, it is. It is a paraphrase of the "O" antiphons, each one starting with the exclamation "O," that are chanted as part of the Liturgy of the Hours

as Christmas approaches. The lyrics of the carol go back to the twelfth century or earlier, and the melody at least as far back as the fifteenth century. Interestingly, though the song is sung in many languages all over the world and the same ancient melody is used everywhere, the tune was first put to the lyrics when it was translated into English. So it is specifically the English version that has spread throughout the world.

Silent Night

"Silent Night" was penned in 1818 by a young Austrian priest who asked the church organist to write a melody to be played on the guitar. Why would an organist, who barely knew how to play gui-



tar, use that instrument for Christmas Mass? It would seem the church organ was out of commission. Whether it was damaged by flooding or hungry church mice is unknown, but the result is a simple, touching song that has become one of the most frequently recorded Christmas carols. We have an American Episcopal priest to thank for translating it into English in 1859.



Hark, the Herald Angels Sing

The cheery tune of **"Hark, the Herald Angels Sing"** was not the author's idea. Charles Wesley, one of the founders of Methodism, requested a slow, somber melody when he

wrote the song in 1739, but apparently it wasn't terribly popular that way. In 1840, a new collection of carols featured a melody adapted from a cantata by Felix Mendelssohn. The cantata was, interestingly, originally written to commemorate the four hundredth anniversary of Gutenberg's invention of the printing press—a rather unlikely source for a Christmas carol.

Away in a Manger

An American tune finally hits the list with **"Away in a Manger,"** written around 1885, but the original promoters claimed it was written by Martin Luther, the German founder of Lutheranism, in the 1500s. Though popular among Pennsylvania Germans, it was unknown in



Germany until years later. The song may have been connected with Martin Luther simply because the author of a collection of Christmas songs wanted to make it sound more impressive. Basically, it was a marketing gimmick.

Blue Christmas/Longest Night Worship With Those Who Mourn

Blue? Yes, blue as in the blues. As in *I am feeling blue*. Not everyone is up and cheery for the Christmas holidays. Dealing with the death of a loved one, facing life after divorce or separation, coping with the loss of a job, living with cancer or some other disease that puts a question mark over the future, loss of a beloved pet and a number of other human situations make parties and joviality painful for many people in our congregations and communities. There is a growing attentiveness to the needs of people who are blue at Christmas. Increasing numbers of churches are creating sacred space for people living through dark times. Such services are reflective, accepting where we really are, and holding out healing and hope.

Pastor Tino will hold a service of worship on the longest night of the year, which falls on December 21st, the Winter Solstice. There is an interesting convergence for this day as it is also the traditional feast day for Saint Thomas the Apostle. This linkage invites making some connections between Thomas's struggle to believe the tale of Jesus' resurrection, the long nights just before Christmas, and the struggle with darkness and grief faced by those living with loss.
