What a year it has been so far! We continue to pray for the safety of our Kupuna, Youth, Young Adults, and to all our families. We also continue to hold in pray those families who have lost loved ones in the past year. We have come to the one-year anniversary in which we began to shut ourselves indoor because of this unseeable virus. There has been a new learning curve for many of us in how to adjust living in isolation, seeing our families through a screen or maybe hearing their voices over the phone. Many of us have yearned for the time in which we can see our loved ones, walk without fear out on the beach, or even perform the simple tasks of shopping. Yet, others have found solace in the quietness, the simple things we take for granted are more appreciated now. Even our Earth Mother has been able to heal itself this past year as reefs begin to regrow, the oceans ecosystem seems to be thriving once again due to the reduction in harmful sunscreen and other chemicals. Inspired by 'ōlelo no 'eau: Ma kāhi o ka hana he ola malaila (where work is, there is life)

About the Piece: Created in collaboration with the Wailuku community, composition elements include visions of past and present Wailuku arts memories and influences, displayed on a billowing purple kimono being created by a teacher and her student from the 1911 Kanda Home in Wailuku, which was a boarding school for "unfortunate Japanese girls." Images include the St. Anthony Boys' School Band of the 1950s with conductor Walter Garcia; Aunty Emma Sharpe, who taught hula classes in Wailuku; Hawaiian Music Icon Willie K; the Philippine tinikling dance - done between bayuhan, wooden pestles used to pound husks off of rice grain; Maui Chamber Orchestra; Maui Academy of Performing Arts and more, with art forms based in Japanese, Portuguese, Filipino and Hawaiian cultures. Together, the piece speaks to Wailuku as the hub of migration and multiculturalism that has given us so many chapters of artistic flavor since memory and available archives serve. Iao UCC's history includes the founding of Kanda Home for Girls by Shigefusa and Sue Kanda, who first opened their own home on Main and Market Streets to educate young girls. Then a larger building on our church grounds provided more space for at least twenty women. After more than fifty years of service, the large wooden building was torn down in 1968. The upper parking lot next to Fujitomo Hall is the present location.

Learn more about Kanda Home for Girls with photos from various sources. The church office has copies of Jiro Nakano's biography of the Kandas. The book is also available for purchase on Amazon; an excerpt of a review states: ...Mrs. Kanda vigorously educated these children to become good U.S. citizens and Christians, despite encountering considerable social and financial hardship. Graduates of the Kanda Home became leaders in the Japanese community and have contributed to the development of modern Hawaii.

In 1993, a hundred year reunion on Maui celebrated the history of Kanda Home. Our church members organized the event that brought many former students back together to reminisce about life in their early years.



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Resurrection Greetings, Everyone!

April 2021 is unique for our Christian faith. This year April 1, 2021, marks the end of Lent. Historically speaking, the end of Lent, or Maundy Thursday, was tied to an iconic moment: the Last Supper. Easter is a floating holiday. According to our tradition, Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday following the full Moon that occurs on or just after the spring equinox.

In accordance with our Christian faith, we probably started gearing up for Easter last month. The Easter holiday requires a ton of prep. For example, we need to devote our attention to activities like decorating eggs and planning an Easter meal. Even with COVID-19 vaccines becoming



more and more available, it's still likely to be a good idea to spend Easter Sunday at home this year. That means thinking about and making decisions on decorations, Easter games, spring crafts, and entertainment.

Here are some Easter reflections; suffering is a theme for all of us. In my view, Jesus seemed to be very much like God, in terms of goodness to others. Yet at the same time, he also seemed so inadequate, in terms of protecting himself.

Jesus cared for others, but that care was not reciprocated by others. Jesus cured others, yet he was brutalized by others. Jesus raised the dead and joined the dead. His resurrection changes all that.

During Easter, the power of God is manifested. A big boulder was put in place to seal Christ's tomb. It was pushed aside like a pebble. The guards who were meant to ensure that his body was not stolen were powerless to contain his now-risen body.

In death, Jesus looked like the most abject of us. Now he resembles God in His glory. Jesus did not call a legion of angels to save himself from death. And he is escorted to life by angels. This represents the circle of life.

Easter means that nothing can keep us from the joy that God wants to give us. Nothing can steal that joy away, not even COVID-19. It's time to take joy in everything, starting with whatever burdens us the most (or whatever it is that makes you angry, sad or depressed). Whatever that is, it can become one of your greatest sources of grace and joy. Yes, it can. God's Blessings

Vaccines to Help Fight Against the COVID-19 Pandemic

How will I know when it's my turn to receive the COVID-19 vaccine?

The Department of Health will inform the public in a variety of ways as more vaccines become available.

Stay informed through your doctor, the web site hawaiicovid19.com, your healthcare provider, or local television, radio or newspapers. Will there be enough vaccine for everyone in Hawaii?

Yes! Although the initial supply is limited, millions more doses are being made and everyone in Hawai'i will eventually be able to be vaccinated.

Will I need to wear a mask and avoid close contact with other people after I have received two doses of the COVID-19 vaccine? Yes, even after you have had both shots, you will need to wear a mask and practice other preventive measures, like avoiding close contact with other

Together with getting vaccinated, covering your mouth and nose with a mask, washing hands often, and staying at least 6 feet away from others will allow us to eventually return to day-to-day activities







Greetings to you all, Please read and understand what you need to know about the vaccine. I am one f many that hesitate to take the vaccine. Working at a clinic and make the choice not to take the vaccine due to my own reason, until today I decided to take the vaccine with the fact that I came from the Government that take this Covid-19 seriously So with all to respect. Getting vaccinated against COVID-19 will get us 'back to normal' more quickly. COVID-19 vaccines are critical in the fight against the pandemic, and the ones being distributed are scientifically proven to be safe and effective. Getting vaccinated not only can help save yourself and protect the lives of others, it can help us return to work, school, and other day-to-day activities faster.

The Hawai'i State Department of Health is partnering with federal and county agencies to distribute the COVID-19 vaccine throughout the state as rapidly and efficiently as possible

But until there is adequate vaccine supply for everyone, the priority is on those who are at the highest risk for

infection or complications if infected. Not yet vaccinated? Please be patient. Learn when it's your turn to get vaccinated through your doctor, health plan provider, employer, or via the web site hawaiicovid19.com.

About the COVID-19 Vaccines: Vaccines work with your immune system so your body will be ready to fight the virus if you are exposed.

The vaccines that you receive are mapproved via the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Emergency Use Authorization, a process that helps speed up the availability of medicines and vaccines during public health emergencies such as the current pandemic. They were evaluated and approved by independent scientists and healthcare professionals. All of the vaccines being administered have gone through the same safety tests and meet the same safety standards as other vaccines. All approved vaccines were tested in tens of thousands of adults from diverse backgrounds, including older adults and communities of color. The most common side effects of the vaccines include sore arms, fevers, and tiredness within 72 hours after the vaccine. These side effects usually mean that the vaccine is working to generate an immune response.
