I came so that they would have life and have it abundantly. – *John 10:10b*

He mana'o o ke kahu

For a couple of weeks, I've been feeling incomplete. Why? My grill had died. I had this one for over 10 years and it served me well, easily grilling steaks, chicken, seafood, veggies, and whatever I threw at it. It had a side burner so I could fry anything and not be worried about the mess. I knew the end was near when huge flames started coming from the back of the burners while nothing came from the front. In addition, one of the wheel supports had rusted away, so it sat propped up on a brick. It was time for a new one and over a recent weekend, I got one — a four-burner model with a side burner for frying foods outside. As soon as I put it together, I was grilling. My kāne card was renewed and I felt life was full and abundant again.

Have you ever felt like that, like you were missing something, that life wasn't full or abundant? Maybe life was good for a time and you were, "cooking with gas." Slowly things didn't have the impact, maybe even to the point that you were feeling down and out, you flame of life had begun to sputter out. If so, it's time to get a new lease on life with the true source of life.

Second Corinthians 5:17 tells us, "Therefore if anyone is in Christ, this person is a new creation; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come." Our life is in Christ. If we are living through him, we will have the energy, the spirit, and the purpose to live. As our key scripture tells us, Christ came so that we might have life and have it abundantly.

Some mistake an abundant life as one full of possessions, but Jesus warns against that, "For what does it benefit a person to gain the whole world, and forfeit his soul?" Mark 8:36 and Mark 10:25 says, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God."

The abundant life means that Christ will give us more than we need, albeit not necessarily what we want. The abundant life means we have a purpose to serve him and only him. The abundant life means life is good ALL THE TIME. So, next time you feel like you are missing something, seek the source of the abundant life, seek Christ, and maybe you'll also get your grill.

Reflecting on October, we were able to celebrate PRIDE in person for the first time since 2019. This years ALOHA MAUI PRIDE Festival was held in Kahului at The Maui Nui Botancial Gardens. It was a free event open to all people of all ages.

I saw familiar faces and made many new friends. The day was filled with various Local vendors, Community agencies, entertainment, food trucks and games for the kids. The cohesiveness was amazing and the amount of people in attendance was the largest I've ever seen.

I couldn't help but feel bittersweet about my conversations with other members of the LGBTQIA+ community. It was similar in content with a storyline of REJECTION and NON ACCEPTANCE from family members, friends and or churches. All I could think was...we must do better! It is crucial for us as humans to feel loved and accepted.


Our adult guest stewards this year will be our watchful neighbors. They all keep an eye on the church grounds and report to Buildings and Grounds any thing our of the ordinary.


Do you remember from your March/April 2022 lao Pepa how B&G planted tiny little fruit trees that had been donated to us by the Rotarty Club?

We had a record month for feeding the hungry. New clients almost every day. Some unsheltered, some from senior housing, some from your neighborhood. We may sound like a broken record, but please continue to give as you can. We usually ask for non perishible items, but if your garden has an abdunace, bring the extra to the pantry on Mondays at 10:30; if you have an extra can of food in your pantry, bring it any time. WOW, if you didn't drive as much this week, put that extra money in an envelope and drop it in the offering plate on Sunday marked "Food Pantry." Many of these people do not get serviced by Cup of Cold Water. Therefore, when receive toiletries, we have started to share with them. So on our list is women's hygiene items and all sizes of diapers. Susan could use help in the pantry Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday.



Advent Begins

Advent is a good time to remind ourselves that many of the Christian symbols we take for granted have rich meaning that often spans centuries. Ritual symbols are not merely designations. Rather, they are *vessels* that contain storied wisdom and the echoes of history. The tradition of the Advent wreath is no exception

While Christians in the Middle Ages were said to have used wreaths with candles during the Christmas season, historians tell us the first *Advent* wreath was conceived in the early 1800s by a Protestant pastor named *Johann Hinrich Wichern*, a man known for his mission work among the urban poor.

One year, around 1830, Johann noticed that during the month of December, the children in his mission school, *Rauhes Haus*, would inquire daily about whether Christmas had arrived. In response to their impatience and constant questioning, he fashioned a "wreath" from the wheel of a cart. It featured 20 red candles and 4 white ones. To help the children mark time in the buildup to Christmas, a new red candle was lit each weekday, increasing the number lit as each day passed. White candles were reserved for Sundays.

Note: Today, some modern lighting fixtures draw upon Johann's design concept. Fixtures of this type are now called "Wichern Wreaths."

While the idea of the Advent wreath caught on in Protestant churches, it didn't reach the United States until the 1920s. It is around this time that Roman Catholics began to adopt the ritual, likely learned from German Catholic and Lutheran immigrants.

As the custom evolved, people began to source materials from the same natural resource used so

dominantly for Christmas decoration: the pine tree.

a circle of evergreen

From the fragrant pine, comes its boughs. The wreath's evergreen garland signifies continuous life with no beginning or end, echoing the symbolic meaning of the wreath's circular shape. Evergreen is also said to signify victory over persecution and suffering.

Pinecones may suggest hope and the seed of life. The small vulnerable pinecone points to the promise of a large towering tree. Holly and berries may also be added. Their red color points ahead to Jesus' sacrifice, death, and resurrection.


