

Reading Mark from the Margins

Beginning Monday, February 5 at 7:00 p.m., there will be a hybrid Bible study using the Gospel of Mark. It will be hybrid because you can either participate in person (in the Conference room with limited space) or via Zoom. That will allow you to choose how you want to participate, and actively participating is how we learn.

The Gospel of Mark is the shortest of the four gospels in the Bible, and most scholars believe it is the earliest. You can easily read the Gospel of Mark in one sitting. While a quick reading is a good way to begin, taking a close look at selected texts and discussing them with others increases our understanding and gives us new insights. Too often Bible studies either jump too quickly into making connections with our contemporary situation or spend so much time on the setting and meaning of the words that connections don't get made with our situation.

For the most part, those who heard and followed Jesus were people on the margins. They were not the wealthy, the influential, or the powerbrokers of Jesus' day. Jesus lived that kind of life as a carpenter who didn't even own enough land to plant a garden. Those in power—both the religious and civil authorities—saw Jesus' message as a threat: you can't announce a kingdom that is **not** the one in control and escape trouble. Mark's gospel is clear from the start that there will be opposition to the "Kingdom of God," and that will lead do Jesus' arrest, trial, conviction, and execution. However, God has the final word on Easter.

As we make our journey toward Easter, what better way is there to prepare than to read Mark from the Margins. Sign up with the Church Office for in-person participation, and also to receive the link for the Zoom meeting. I am looking forward to learning with you starting February 5.
