Kahu Kalani's Konnections

Last month, I had the privilege of blessing the new Frito-Lay Warehouse and Distribution Center in Kahului. Large container trucks deliver products there so local drivers can load them for markets and convenience stores across the island—places where we can easily pick up our favorite snacks.



Before the blessing, I spoke with the Chief of Operations for the Hawai'i region. I asked how the war in Iran was affecting transportation costs. He explained that the impact reached every part of their work, including fuel for delivery vehicles, gas for the fryers, and even the packaging, which is made from petroleum-based materials.

That is only part of the picture. The farmers who grow the corn, potatoes, and wheat used in chips and snacks also depend on fuel and fertilizer, both tied to oil. All these separate elements come together when we purchase a single bag of chips.

When we look at life from a wider perspective, we begin to see how one thing affects another. We also see how the work of one person depends on the efforts of many others, especially those serving on the front lines of production.

This same sense of working toward a shared purpose is also present in the church. 1st Corinthians 12:12 reminds us, “Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ.” Each of us has a role to play in carrying out the work of the Gospel. No one is greater than another; each of us shares God's love in our own way. Whether you read during worship, donate financial resources, offer sweat equity through volunteering, or answer phones in the office, you are using the gifts you have received

to serve others (1st Peter 4:10). I give thanks for the many ways you support 'Īao UCC so that our ministry may continue into the next 130 years.

As we commemorate Labor Day, let us give thanks for all who help bring a simple meal to our tables: those who labor in the fields, those who prepare and transport the food, and those whose expertise supports each step along the way. May we remember that every meal, like every ministry, is made possible through the faithful work of many hands.

Moderator's Mana'o

"God has a plan." This is a phrase we hear, especially when faced with challenging situations. Our church has faced a number of challenges over the years, and we have learned important lessons and made appropriate changes when needed, resulting in a safer church and a more resilient congregation. Right now, we are faced with two challenges—the need for an office assistant and a new settled pastor.

In Genesis 45, we read of Joseph's reconciliation with his brothers, who through their actions, has Joseph sold into slavery in Egypt. Years later and faced with a famine, the brothers go to Egypt hoping to secure food for their family in Canaan. Once there, they are brought before Joseph, whom they do not recognize. He, however, recognizes his brothers.

The irony is that when he meets with them, he does not blame them for their actions but instead speaks of "God's plan." He says it was God's plan that he ends up in Egypt, endures hardships, gains the favor of the king, and rises to the highest level. Through God's plan, he is then able to see the people of Egypt through the seven-year famine and in the process help his family.

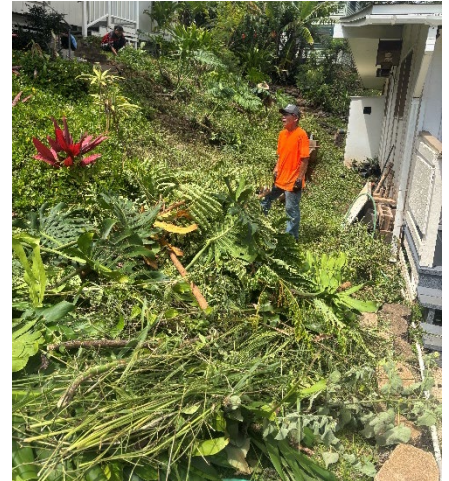
While our church's situation is in no way comparable in scope to Joseph's situation, we, too, are able to see some positive outcomes for our lack of a consistent office administrative assistant and the vacancy of a settled pastor. For example, members have ventured out of their comfort zone and volunteered to assist in the office and take responsibility for tasks they would not normally do.

Others have taken on leadership positions that highlight their skills and show our congregation how fortunate we are to have them as part of our church community. At the right time, we will find someone who is a good fit for the office administrative assistant position. Within the next few months, we will find a settled pastor who will lead us into the future, and with the guidance and wisdom granted by God, help us to grow and flourish, if that is God's plan.

Buildings and Grounds

The Buildings and Grounds Community continues to work diligently on keeping our church grounds and facilities in great condition. Unfortunately, time takes its toll and the electrical system in Endo Hall has been impacted by this. Power to many of the outlets and lights are out of order. A temporary fix is in place, and an electrician has been hired to make the repairs though this may take a while as permits are issued. Until it is fully repaired, please be patient.

Please note in your personal calendars that the 4th Saturday of the month is a workday to take care of cleaning and beautification projects around the church grounds. “Many hands make light work” and we truly need your hands. The work starts at 8:00 and goes until noon. No skills necessary, just a willing heart.

Membership Classes

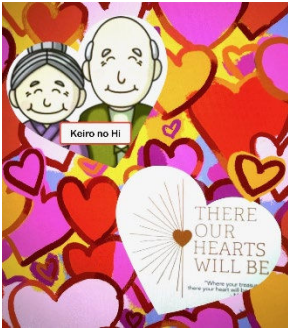

A Life Well Lived

The sanctuary was filled to capacity, with an overflow crowd gathered under a tent outside, as the community came together to bid farewell to David Murata. Speaker after speaker shared how David had touched their lives. As family and friends listened, they discovered even more about the person they knew as dad, grandpa, friend, colleague, and faithful servant.

One of the most moving stories came from Pennie Arounsack, whose family arrived in the United States as refugees from Laos. David helped them settle into a new land, get jobs, find a home, and understand how education could open doors for the children. With David and Grace's encouragement, the children excelled in school, graduated from college, and remained connected with the Murata family through the years.



Today, Pennie serves as Director of IT and Innovation for the City of Manteca, California. Her brother Steven is a professor of Anthropology at California State University, Stanislaus, and has served as a lead cultural advisor and visual anthropologist for films and productions, including Disney's Oscar-nominated *Raya and the Last Dragon*. Through their care and encouragement, David and Grace helped the Arounsacks move from the uncertainty of refugee life toward lives of purpose, service, and achievement.

David brought that same commitment to the Micronesian community as families settled into their new home on Maui. Through his leadership, he helped Marshallese, Chuukese, Pohnpeian, and Kosraean

churches get started, encouraging them to worship in their own languages and cultures. In recognition of his support, he was named an honorary deacon in the Marshallese church.

Mahalo, David, for your loving presence and caring commitment to opening doors for so many.

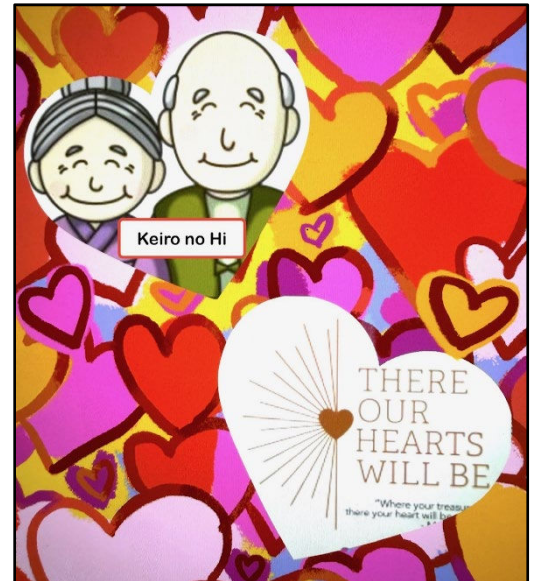
New Sunday School year begins.
